The papers of the United Automobile Workers - International Affairs Department, Victor Reuther and Herman Rebhan were placed in the Archives of Labor and Urban Affairs in 1979 and opened for research in June of 1982.

The International Affairs Department was created in December, 1955, and originally, Victor Reuther was the director and Lewis Carliner was his assistant. Carliner left the UAW in 1968. (For the records of the this period see the UAW International Affairs Dept - Victor Reuther and Lewis Carliner,) In January, 1969 Herman Rebham succeeded Lewis Carliner as assistant director. The papers in this collection relate to the International Affairs Department when Victor Reuther and Herman Rebham worked together. Victor Reuther retired in April, 1972, and Herman Rebham was appointed the new director.

This collection includes the papers of the Social, Technical and Education Programs (STEP) which was created as a division of the International Affairs Department in 1966. (There are a few records relating to STEP dated 1966-68, but they are in an earlier collection.) Due to the expanded activities of the Social, Technical and Educational Programs, in March, 1973 the division was elevated to departmental status and its headquarters was transferred to Detroit. All the STEP records in this collection are dated 1969 - December, 1972.

In 1966, the Executive Board of the UAW created a Social, Technical and Education Programs (STEP) division within the International Affairs Department to help underdeveloped countries to overcome natural disasters, hunger, disease and ignorance. Later, this division was expanded to aid underdeveloped regions within the United States. This division had legal authorization to contract with agencies of the U.S. government, such as the Agency for International Development. and the Peace Corps, and with various private organizations to administer the assistance programs which were financed from government and private grants and from other voluntary contributions. Due to the expanded activites of the Social, Technical, and Education Programs, the UAW Executive Board decided to physically separate STEP from the International Affairs Department. In March, 1973, the division was elevated to departmental status and its headquarters was transfered from Washington to Solidarity House in Detroit. Between 1966 and 1972, Victor Reuther directed the division, but most of the actual work was performed by Gerald Daniel, the exective director, and his assistant, Stanley Greenspan. The records are divided into two sections; outgoing correspondence and Office File. The outgoing correspondence consists of copies of letters sent by Victor Reuther, Herman Rebhan, Gerald Daniel, Stanley Greenspan, and Guy Nunn. It is divided into five parts, and the names of the correspondents are listed on secondary folder entries. The office file consists of records pertaining to non-UAW Organizations, U.S. government agencies, UAW departments, and foreign countries, which because of the small quantity of the records, are arranged alphabetically.

Index to Correspondents

This index includes many, but not all, of the correspondents in this collection who wrote letters of substance. In some cases, where a correspondent wrote only one or two letters, the entries were eliminated. The following persons, who because of their positions as creators of the records in this collection and who are therefore responsible for a preponderant amount of the correspondence, were omitted from this index: Victor Reuther, Herman Rebhan, Gerald Daniel, Stanley Greenspan, and Guy Nunn. Only the names of persons sending the letters are indexed. Some of the correspondence consists of copies of letters sent to third parties. Such letters are indexed, but at all times the names listed refer to the persons who wrote the letters. Some of the correspondence may be drafts of letters written by Victor Reuther or Herman Rebhan and signed by other persons. These letters are included in the index, but the researcher should be aware that such letters may never have been sent or may have been sent in a different form. In some cases, because a correspondent may not be well known, the title of the position which he or she held during the time period of the collection is noted. The dates of the letters (year only) are also included.

The index is arranged alphabetically by surnames of the correspondents. The first number signifies the box number; the number after the colon indicates in which folders the letters are located. The date of the letters is listed in parenthesis. In cases where there are preponderant amounts of correspondence in several folders from persons listed in the index, and the surname of the correspondent appears in the guide a secondary folder entry, the box number is given. Irving Bluestone's surname, for example, appears on folders listed in Box 20 of the guide as President-Bluestone, Irving. The index points out that some of his letters are located in these folders by listing the box number after his name. Mr. Bluestone was also director of the General Motors Department, and some of his letters are in folders in Box 19 under General Motors Department, but his name is not listed in the guide. The index shows that some of his letters are in these folders by listing his title and putting the box number after it.
