The papers of Harold Norris were placed in the Archives of Labor and Urban Affairs in 1971 and opened for research in May of 1981.

Harold Norris was born in Detroit in 1918 and educated in Detroit public schools. He then attended the University of Michigan where he earned a B.A. and an M.A. in economics. During World War II he was trained as a statistical officer at Harvard by the Army Air Force, and he served in Europe for three years in that capacity. In 1948 he earned a law degree from Columbia University and was admitted to the bar.

Norris engaged in the general practice of law in Detroit until his appointment to the faculty of the Detroit College of Law in 1961 where he teaches criminal and constitutional law. He joined the American Civil Liberties Union in 1952, was elected chairman of the Detroit branch in 1958, and has represented the ACLU in many civil liberties cases. He has served on a number of committees and study groups, among them, Governor Williams' Commission to Study the Problem of the Uninsured Motorist, the Detroit Commission on Children and Youth, and the negligence law committees of the Detroit and state bar associations. He was elected a delegate to the Michigan constitutional convention and helped write the civil rights provisions of the Michigan constitution.

He is the author of Mr. Justice Murphy and the Bill of Rights, A Casebook of Complete Criminal Trials, and You Are this Nation, a book of poems.

The papers in this collection relate to Norris's work with the ACLU, the National Lawyers Guild, the State Bar of Michigan, and his interest in a broad range of civil liberties issues. A few photographs have been transferred to the Archives Audio Visual collections and a large number of books and pamphlets donated with this collection are available in the Archives Library.
