Dear Madam:

I take pleasure in replying to your inquiry of Jan. 29.

Our engineering courses were erected about 1870. The engineering faculties exist under the guidance of three colleges, one for Civil Engineering, another for Mechanical and Electrical and a third for Mining Engineering.

In the Civil Engineering college, so far as I know, there has only been one woman graduate, Miss Julia Morgan of the class of 1894, now a practising architect in San Francisco, offices in the Merchants Exchange Building.

Otherwise we have had almost no women students; practically no women have registered in our engineering courses during the last ten years. A few women have taken courses in engineering preliminary subjects, such as surveying, but they have mainly been students registered in other departments, such as Architecture, Agriculture and Public Health.

I can give you no information for our colleges of Mechanical, Electrical and Mining Engineering. It would be necessary for you to write direct to Dean C. L. Cory of the College of Mechanics and Dean F. H. Probert of the College of Mining, but I believe I am correct in stating that the information that you would receive would be similar to that for Civil Engineering.

Dear Madam: -

I have your circular letter of January 29th, inquiring about the names of women of the University who are now, or have been, registered in our Engineering College.

Under our State system of higher education, women are not admissable to the University of Florida, nor men to the Florida State College for Women at Tallahassee. While the State College at Tallahassee does not have any engineering departments, it does offer courses in applied science; and if you think it worth while, you might send one of your circulars of inquiry there.

While we cannot legally register women in the College of Engineering here, there is nothing to prevent our admitting them as visitors to the classes, which permits them to get all the benefit of instruction altho without definite status as students. Hitherto, there has been no demand for engineering courses here on the part of women, except in one case, that of Miss Leanora Semmes, who is now taking work in Mechanical Drawing. Her address is Gainesville, Fla
